While the Bible does not provide a scientifically accurate description of how God created the world and everything in it, it does explain why God made it. God created the world out of love; said it was good and gave humans the responsibility of helping him to sustain it by tilling the soil and being good stewards and caretakers.

In the first chapter of Genesis God said: "Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth..."

However, because of the sins of humanity, the world isn't how God intended it to be. We don't always love God, each other or the created world as we should.

Shortly before she died in 1941, Evelyn Underhill, one of England's most important writers on Christian spirituality, described God as the Eternal Artist who created the world and continues to sustain it with what she calls 'the Music of Eternity'.

Humans have introduced disharmony reflected in war, poverty, racism and mistreatment of the environment.

God's solution was and is to send his Son Jesus Christ to show us how to help him restore harmony, to create a new heaven and a new earth and a new and more just society. The Lord's Prayer invites us to join in this task. In it, Jesus teaches us to pray for God's Kingdom to come, His will to be done.

Underhill wrote that if we slow down and carefully listen to God's 'Music of Eternity', we too can join in God's continual song of love.

In an introduction to the book "Saying Yes to Life", The Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby wrote this: "As part of the global church we are called to care not just for God's creation, but for our brothers and sisters all over the world who face having their families uprooted and their livelihoods destroyed by the effects of climate change. Every single one of us has a responsibility as part our discipleship to Christ to live a life that cares for God's world and its creatures."

So how might we do this? What part can we play?

A starting place would be to learn more about the environment from a Christian perspective by visiting Christian environmental websites such as A Rocha www.arocha.org.uk, Climate Stewards www.climatestewards.org or Green Anglicans www.greenanglicans.org

For instance, A Rocha has some suggestions for how to commit to a 'Green Lent' by choosing from one or two of these ideas for the 40 days of Lent:

- Go plastic free.
- **Switch off from digital.** Switch off the internet for the first hour in the morning and the last hour at night or have 'switch off Sundays'.
- Buy less or buy second hand.
- Buy local or in bulk.
- Spend more time in nature.
- Try a plant-based recipe or diet.

Who knows, maybe a 'Green Lent' will inspire us to tread more lightly upon the earth. It could be a prelude to a new way of living.



The story of the yellow ribbons

We are loved with everlasting love! One of the greatest and most comforting doctrines taught in the Bible is the love of God for His people. In the Law and in the Prophets; in the poetical and historical books; in Gospels and Letters – all agree to tell us what God said to His people through Jeremiah. "I have loved you with an everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3).

It was that love that moved the Father to send His Son into the world (John 3:16). Paul writes glowingly of "that great love with which He loved us" (Ephesians 2:4). John emphasises the same great truth in a magnificent creed of just three words: 'God is love' (1 John 4:8). Quite simply there is nothing in all creation more reassuring, more comforting, more encouraging, more uplifting than to know that God loves us. And we can go further and put it in personal terms as Paul did. 'He loved me and gave Himself for me' (Galations 2:21).

How can we illustrate the illimitable love of God? One such illustration was told by the Rev John Wilbur Chapman of Indiana, an ordained Presbyterian minister who in 1893 went into full-time evangelistic ministry.

One evening Chapman was travelling by train in a rural part of Kansas. The other passenger in the carriage was a young man who kept glancing out the window and then covering his face with his hands. Chapman asked if he could help.

The young man confessed that many years before he had run away from home and 'sown his wild oats.' He had not written to his parents at all, until a few weeks before, telling them that he would be travelling on this train. At a certain point it passed very close to his home. In the letter he had begged his parents' forgiveness and asked if they wanted him to come home. If so, they were to tie a yellow ribbon on the old apple tree that grew right beside the railway lines.

"Sir," he said to Chapman, "the train will soon pass my home but I'm afraid to look. If there's a yellow ribbon on the tree, I'll get off at the next station and go home. If there's no ribbon, I'll just travel on. But I'm too afraid to look out for the tree." So Chapman offered to look for him.

"You can open your eyes now,' he said a few minutes later. The returning prodigal looked at Chapman with tears and quivering lips. 'All is well,' said the evangelist. 'There is a yellow ribbon on the apple tree. In fact, there's far more than one. Every branch is hanging with yellow ribbons, scores and scores of them. Your parents love you that much, they want you to come home."

If parents can love their wayward children like that, how much greater is the love of God! Truly, we are loved with everlasting love.

If you have been in Letchworth recently you may have noticed one more shop has disappeared from Leys Avenue. The Christian Bookshop closed in February after more than fifty years on the high street in North Herts.



We believe it will be sadly missed, not just by regular churchgoers, but by all those who have a sneaking suspicion that the fundamental answers to the meaning of life are found in the words of the bible and the life of Jesus Christ – but haven't quite got round to following it up yet. The shop provided a place on the high street to ask questions, find bibles and books to help, or maybe just sit awhile in a place of peace and welcome.

Of course, times have changed. When the shop opened, there was no internet, no credit card machine, no online shopping, no streaming of music and video, no e-books, and of course no Covid 19. Even for a non-profit organisation it has been increasingly difficult to survive these changes.

But to quote the writer of Ecclesiastes "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven". For those fifty years the Christian Bookshop was the right shop in the right place. It has now retired to let other initiatives take over. You can now find the words of Jesus on a smartphone bible app without having to buy a bible. If you would like to buy a bible or explanatory book you can do so online without leaving home. Our churches are accessible in person or online to those who want to drop in and ask questions or join an Alpha group.

So for those with that "sneaking suspicion" here is another quote, this time a promise from Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount: "Seek and you will find" - or to pinch that tagline from the X factor "the truth is out there"!



A True Reminder of Just How Special Friendship Is!



In 2020 in support of his friend and team-mate Rob Burrows who had been diagnosed with MND Kevin Sinfield OBE ran seven marathons in seven days and raised £2.7million for the MND Association. That smashed the former England playmaker's initial target of £77,777, a nod to the number seven shirt which Rob Burrow wore for Leeds during his 17-year rugby league career.

Then last November Kevin completed another incredible fundraising feat called 'The Extra Mile Challenge'. He put his running shoes back on in Leicester and completed 101 miles within 24 hours to arrive at Headingly Stadium. Kevin's initial target for this was to raise £100,000, however the total donations split between MND Association and Leeds Hospitals Charity currently stands at just over £2.1 million.



The government has pledged to put at least £50m into MND research over the next five years.

Currently there is no cure for MND, but there are treatments to help reduce the impact it has on a person's daily life.

The Love of Wisdom of Natural Things

Some time ago a scientist was invited to speak at the Dewsbury Women's Institute. He spoke about his research on polymers, hoping that the women of this Yorkshire mill town would connect with his desire to develop new fibres.

One person in particular, a woman called Betty who had worked in a mill since the age of 15, listened as if her life depended on it, and peppered him with questions afterwards. She had always been interested in how things work, but until that day had not found anyone to answer her questions. Whenever she had asked about the processes that they were using in the mill, she was just told to get on with her job.

From the outside, science can seem a closed specialty, hemmed in by intimidating jargon. When McLeish described science as 'the love of wisdom of natural things', however, he realised he was opening a door. He was moved to see that Betty was not the only person who shed a tear when her questions were finally taken seriously, confirming that her enquiring mind was indeed probing in the right direction – only fifty years too late.

Hearing about people like Betty reminds me that science is a very natural activity for anyone to be involved in. McLeish is convinced that there is a future in 'science therapy'. In his book Faith and Wisdom in Science, where this story appears, he asks the question "If a reintroduction to the activity of representing both inner and outer worlds in paint, music and drama can help to heal minds, what hope might there be for a participation in a gentle and contemplative science in restoring a broken or misunderstood relationship with the physical world?"

This story inspired me to run a number of hands-on science activities with adult audiences in churches. I have extracted DNA from strawberries with a midweek group for older people, organised hands-on exhibits to liven up lecture or discussion events, and even had groups extracting DNA from their own cheek cells.

Every time I lead activities like these, I find that grown-ups are grateful for the opportunity to have a go at science themselves. I love helping church-based groups, in particular, to reconnect with science and celebrate what they find. Science is not just for children and professionals – it is for everyone to enjoy and explore the world God made.



Enter my rest

At this time of the year, we are planning our gardens for the Spring and Summer ahead. The book of Genesis opens with a glorious account of God's work of creation, and it also tells us that God rested on the seventh day.

We all need to find that balance of work and rest, of activity and slowing down in our lives. And we are not always good at that because our world seems to be in the fast lane. We rush everywhere, we rush out of habit, and we rush because everyone around us is rushing.

'The Potato Planters' by Jean-Francois Millet, a 19th century French artist,



portrays two peasants at work. They don't seem to be rushing, but Millet certainly portrayed the hard toil of their work, digging in the earth from sunrise to sunset to eke out a living. Millet was the son of a farm labourer and many of his paintings convey the severe realism of peasant life. We can sympathise with the couple working on the land. and our eyes focus on them they dominate the as canvas.

But in the corner under the shade of a tree there is a donkey and a sleeping child. The donkey knows only too well the reality of toil and work, but here he is resting, enjoying the peace and the shade. Andy Merrifield, an American philosopher, has just published an account of his travels with a donkey, Gribouille. As they journey together, the donkey teaches him the value of patience, the importance of going slowly through the world, and the preciousness of tender friendship between humans and animals. They are all caught up in the little donkey in this painting.

The man and woman in the foreground may reflect our own lives with the duties, the expectations and the demands called of us at work. Take time to focus on the donkey, enjoying his rest. Take time this Spring and Summer to find relaxation and recreation. The world may carry on spinning around us, but we can stand apart, and enter into the rest that God enjoyed after His work of creation.

God the Creator - by Paul Hardingham

For many today the universe began with a big bang, in which a lump of matter, smaller than a pinhead, exploded 15 billion years ago. It's a story that defines who we are and where we come from. However, the Bible gives us another perspective on this event, revealing God as Creator: 'By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible' (Hebrews 11:3). What does Genesis 1 say about God as Creator?

'In the beginning, God'

Whereas science can offer answers about the *how* of creation, the Bible tells us about the *why* i.e. the purpose of the Creator! Creation reflects the character and glory of God, inviting a response of dependence and praise!

'God created the heavens and the earth'

God shaped the universe. expressed in the '6 days' creation. They speak of an ordered purposeful and universe expresses God's will: He spoke and it was done! An alternative translation is 'God began creating', reminding us that creation is also an ongoing process, where the Holy Spirit is still at work in our lives and world.

'God created man in His own image'


In the account, human beings are presented as the climax and crown of creation. We share the sixth day of creation with other creatures, as well as 95% of the same DNA. However. we are distinctively made in the of God. created for image relationship with God. with responsibility to care for the created order.

'And God saw that it was good'

Like an artist, God described His work as *good*. We should always approach this story with wonder, enjoying God's world and affirming creativity in ourselves and others.
